What is the Mission of the Church?

To preach the Good news to all nations
 In this role lay people – women and men – are EQUAL to the ordained
 Fundamental to our effectiveness in achieving this is our relationship to Jesus

and the Church

Encountering Jesus leads to discipleship

- Master, Where do you live? [Jn 1:38]
 - Come, follow me
- Encountering Jesus in the Church and in the Sacraments
 - Eucharist nourishes us for our journey
 - Baptism, Confirmation
 - Not just about belonging, but through these sacraments we are sent OUT
 - >we are anointed for mission

Anointing

Gives us a share in the role of prophet, priest and king – AS LAY PEOPLE – AS WOMEN

In baptism all God's people are EQUAL

Ordination circumscribes and limits the freedom we have as laity

Baptism & Confirmation

In baptism and Confirmation we receive:

- Sanctifying grace (for us to keep)
- Charisms (for us to give away)
- Supernatural gifts supernatural results
- These sacraments equip us for our vocation as Christians
- Where is this vocation lived out?
 - In the world (cf Lumen Gentium)



Through baptism we are made **co-responsible** for the mission of the Church



The future of the Church

"... demands a change in mindset, particularly concerning lay people. They must no longer be viewed as "collaborators" of the clergy but truly recognized as "co-responsible", for the Church's being and action, thereby fostering the consolidation of a mature and committed laity." *Benedict XVI*

Co-responsibility: working together as equals with a common baptism – distinct not the same roles

Ordained: Sacramental Priesthood: for the sake of the Church

- Authority confined to the Church
- Receive formation for mission
- Receptive to expertise of laity in the world
- Leadership in Church
- Make Christ present on the altar

People of God: Sharing Christ's Royal Priesthood: for the sake of the World

- Authority in the world
- Need formation for mission which is distinctly for lay people
- Leadership in the world represent the concerns of the world to the Church
- Make Christ present in the world

Dorothy Day

- 1897: Born Brooklyn, NY
- 1906: homelessness after San Fransisco earthquake leaves lasting impression
- 1915-26: New York 'drifting years':
 leaves uni, journalist for socialist
 newspaper; Communist; string of love
 affairs, abortion
- 1926: Pregnant with only child; stirs
 feelings of redemption; embraces
 Catholicism; relationship with de facto,
 Forster Battingham ends

- Pacifist; opposes Nuclear weapons
- Involved in American Civil Rights movement
- 1965: travels to Rome to fast and pray during closing session of Vatican II
- 1973: Joins Cesar Chavez in campaigning for worker's rights
 - > 1980: dies in NY
- 2000: Cardinal O'Connor initiates cause for beatification
- Able to do all this because she acted as a layperson – she was not committing the whole Church to a particular course of action

Mission of the Laity

Bestowed through Baptism & Confirmation

- Lived out in a uniquely individual way.
- Freer to experiment and be innovative than the ordained.
- Be prepared to take risks

Caroline Chisholm First woman in Australia to

- Publish on a matter of social policy
 - On Female Immigration (1841)
- Take a case to court and win
 - Sued Captain and surgeon of Carthiginian for maltreatment of passenger 'most significant case in colony so far'
- Assist government by appearing before three enquiries on immigration

Caroline Chisholm

- Settled immigrant girls
- Returned to England and established FCLS
- Mother of 9 children
- Caroline and Archibald: Model of Christian Marriage
- Her work not supported by Archbishop Polding who did not understand that Australia was ready for the a social ministry led by women ... he did not hace the language for the concept of her work
- Settled more than 11,000 peole in Australia (Sydney was only a city of about 30,000 when she arrived in the late 1830s)
- Died in poverty

Woman of Faith
