

PAST ATTEMPTS AT A DIOCESAN PASTORAL COUNCIL - OUR LEGACY

The Archdiocese first formed a pastoral council in 195? Under Archbishop Eris O'Brien; other iterations were formed by Archbishops Cahill and Carroll, while Archbishop Coleridge preferred a series of assemblies. These had a variety of forms and expressed both the needs and the resources of the Archdiocese in each time.

The Archdiocesan Synod of 1989, Coming Home in Christ, was tasked to "listen to what the Spirit is saying to us today" and gave rise to a Pastoral Planning Committee to implement the efforts of the Archdiocesan Church's efforts to answer the challenges of the Second Vatican Council.

We have much to celebrate as a local Church in and through the work of the Diocesan Pastoral Councils – it is now an appropriate time to refound such a body to assist in the ongoing governance of the Church in the Archdiocese.

The Working Party will consider our legacy – what needs to be acknowledged and celebrated? What needs to be learned? In this phase of their work they will consider a variety of documents and research including our archives relating to Archdiocesan Pastoral Councils; the accounts of the two Synods since the Second Vatican Council and a history of Diocesan Pastoral Councils in Australia developed for the Bishops Conference.
